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YSM launches partnership for better learning



Shortly after we launched our robust adult program *Bridges* in the fall of 2016, our team began developing an education program and identified the need for a literacy partner who could help community members overcome this critical barrier. In response we launched a pilot project in partnership with Dixon Hall in spring 2017.

Community members were initially hesitant, but thanks to the support and encouragement of YSM staff, fear and hesitation quickly grew into determination. YSM worked with five adults who were hoping to improve their literacy levels and walked alongside them – assisting with initial assessments and accompanying them to Dixon Hall. Four of the five participants successfully completed the pilot project, with two continuing on with Dixon Hall for additional courses

and another moving on to take advanced courses. Given the success of the pilot, YSM is now working with Dixon Hall as part of our education plan that will help connect community members with meaningful employment.

The level of literacy varies greatly with community members so we determined that multiple partners were needed. As a result, YSM is now partnering with the Toronto Public Library, who has provided us with an *Adult Literacy Deposit Collection;* materials that support adult learning and meet the diverse interests and needs of adult learners. They also assisted with training YSM volunteers who will be providing one-on-one tutoring to adults who wish to increase their literacy levels.



YSM's **HELPING HANDS**

Jean Thomas has been volunteering with YSM's Educational Supports program, providing free one-on-one tutoring to our community youth for the past year. Our volunteer tutors work with youth and adults to improve their marks, specifically those with multilevel barriers to success in the academic field. These individuals come from low-income households, with very little family support due to barriers in language and education and consequently have fewer opportunities to find one-on-one support to learn at their own pace and learning style. The one-on-one tutoring has proven to significantly increase the students' likelihood to graduate from high-school, while helping them successfully transition to post-secondary school. The program would not be possible without our dedicated volunteer tutors.

"Having immigrated to Canada a few years ago, I feel fortunate to be in this country. I started tutoring at YSM because I wanted to give back to the community I now call home and saw that there was a need to help students reach their academic potential. Each student has their own rhythm and I am constantly adapting to their learning styles. Seeing the students improve their grades and build confidence is my favourite part of volunteering. I believe that collaboration between organizations and individuals means that we can achieve more together and reach a common goal faster."

Jessica Fennessey was this year's recipient of YSM's Bob & Jane Graham Award, awarded to an employee who demonstrates a superior capacity to engage volunteers. Jessica has trained and overseen dozens of volunteers during their time with us, caring for their needs, taking the time to address their questions and celebrating their successes. She strives to create a friendly and inspiring work environment for volunteers and makes them feel like they are part of the YSM family on a daily basis.

"Working at YSM has been a great learning opportunity for me, both personally and professionally. My job requires me to process donations and my favourite part of the job is that I get to work with great volunteers who donate their time, which allows us to operate to our max potential. Without the care and commitment of our volunteers, much of the work that we do would not be possible. Collaboration between staff and volunteers is also very important because we all come from different backgrounds and bring something different to the table. Collectively, we have a wealth of knowledge that can be put to use for the greater good."

YSM launches pop-up shop with local women's organization

On July 25, Show[case] – a unique space within our Double Take Thrift Store where customers can find antique items and upscale clothing cleared some space for a fun collaboration with Regent Park's Creative Women's Collective, a subset of the Women's Development Network (WDN).

YSM's Community Development team provided guidance for the group of women and our Double Take Store Manager mentored them, providing insight into the world of retail and helping them with the creative process, merchandising and marketing.

Their creations, which consist of hand-made jewelry, knitwear, sewn items and specialty foods will be available for sale at Double Take until **January 2017**.
